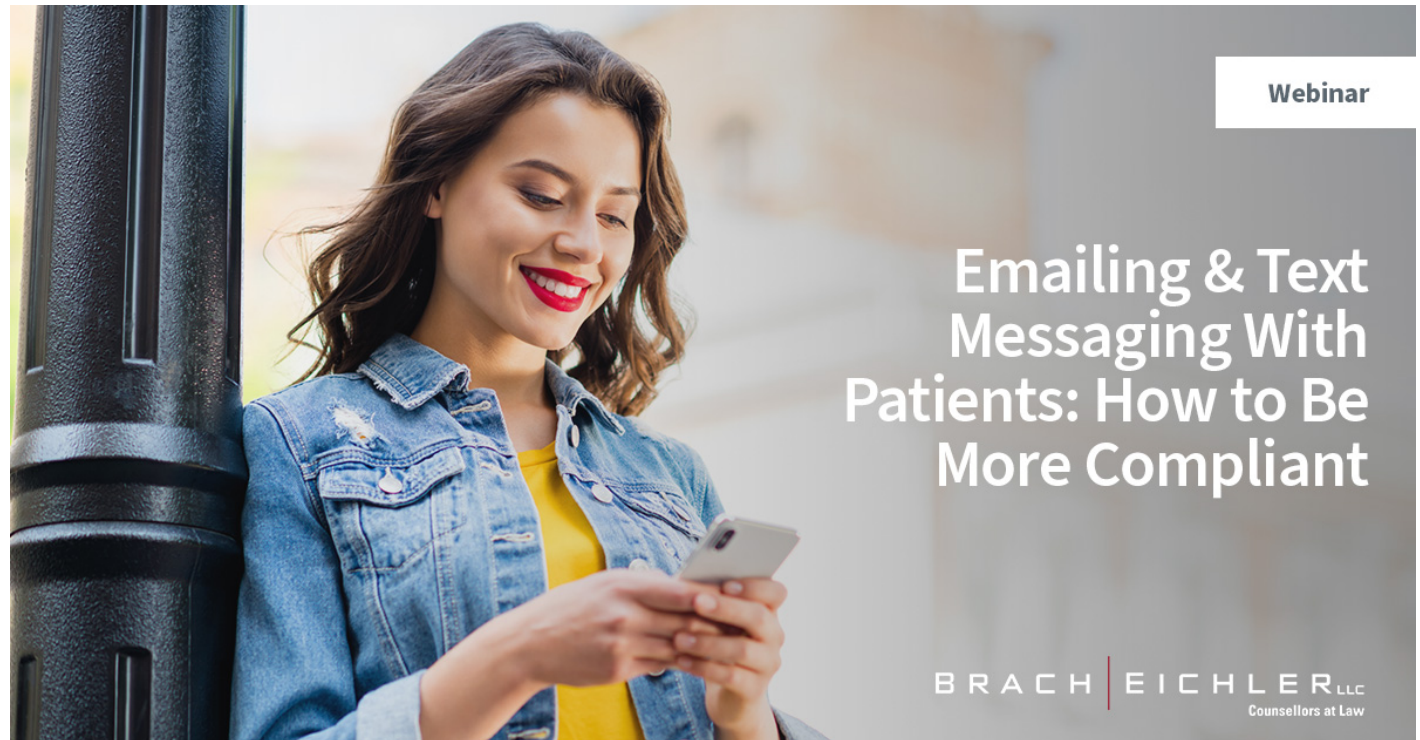


Emailing & Text Messaging With Patients: How to Be More Compliant (Webinar)
